Toolooa State High School will receive**

This funding will be used to

Achieve:

- 100% QCE and QCIA attainment of our 2017 year 12 students
- 100% QCE attainment of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students
- Reading: 98% of year 7 students at or above NMS with 25% U2B; 95% of Year 9 students at or above NMS with 18% U2B
- Writing: 90% of year 7 students at or above NMS; 85% of year 9 students at or above NMS; 15% U2B yrs 7 and 9.
- Whole School Improvement in Reading and Writing in years 7 and 9 above the average national improvement.

Our initiatives include

- Targeted programs for our low ability readers and writers differentiated for their individual ability level
- Focussed whole school wellbeing program to further strengthen targeted support and engagement strategies to influence student success.
- Improved teacher understanding of reading and writing standards and strategies for student support
- Collaborative, targeted year level meetings to identify and support the needs of our students in reading and writing
- Data tracking and analysis process embedded in school processes targeting Reading, Writing, Senior Outcomes – additional time allocated to teachers to analyse student results and provide targeted, personal student feedback

Our school will improve student outcomes by

- Retaining HOD Literacy at 0.6 FTE (\$75 000)
- Retaining HOD Teaching and Learning - Pedagogy Coach at 0.6 FTE (\$75 000)
- Recruitment of HOD Wellbeing to support whole school systems of support and engagement (\$137 000)
- Additional teacher aide time to support targeted reading and writing support (\$31 644)
- Additional Youth Pathways teacher aide time to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in their Senior Phase of Education (\$31 200)
- Data Collection – Implementation of an extensive literacy internal monitoring system across the school to inform teaching practice (\$10 000)
